Bits and Pieces



Choices, Choices, Choices

When you enter the classroom at the Computer Club you will see a totally different arrangement. On each desk sits an Apple monitor, an Apple keyboard, a PC keyboard, an Apple mouse, and a PC mouse. Students can choose the Operating System they want, and feel comfortable. The towers are gone. All the components are contained within the monitor shell, including a CD/DVD drive as well as an SD card slot. Instructors and class members have plenty of desk space. How was all this accomplished?

Ted Gray, Tech Director, and Joe Parla, Assistant, spent the bulk of their summer setting up each computer with a program called VMware-Fusion and adding all necessary software to the computers. VMware-Fusion allows for running multiple operating systems on each computer. So you have a choice of Windows XP, Vista, Windows 7, or OS X - Snow Leopard. Choose your operating system, your keyboard, and your mouse. (Interesting enough, you can use a PC keyboard and an Apple mouse, or vice versa with any of the operating systems). Once you have opened the operating system of your choice you will feel completely "at home."

You will also notice on the desktop of each computer two folders. One labeled "Class," and one labeled "Instructor." The instructors can store handouts and materials needed for their classes. The students can store things they are working on in the "Class" folder and it will be there the next time you need it. In the storeroom is a server that stores all this information. Instructors no longer have to go from one computer to another putting things on the desktop to be used in their class(es). That can be done from the Instructor's computer.

I think you will like these changes with choices.

For PC Users: Win+Space- All windows are made transparent so you can see the desktop.

For Mac Users: If you have trouble opening a .doc attachment, hold the control key, click on the attachment, select Pages from the drop down menu, and the attachment will open. Open .exc attachments with Numbers, and .ppt attachments with Keynote.

Print for less

Save ink, save paper, be green

Here's a surprising way to save money: Change your printing habits. It's quick and easy, and could save you more than a few bucks on paper and ink—not to mention

make you a little friendlier to the environment. Dean Gallea, our printing expert, shared these tips with me.

■ **TRY ANOTHER FONT.** Who knew that one font could use a lot more ink than another? When our engineers tested that seemingly wacky theory, they printed 27 percent more pages per ink cartridge using the 12-point Times New Roman font rather than Arial in the same size. Calibri is another ink-saving choice. The box below shows how many pages you can print with those fonts and others.

■ **PRINT IN DRAFT MODE.** Another way to keep your inkwell from running dry too quickly is to print in draft mode. Our tests have shown that you'll use about half the amount of ink that way. On some models, the

quality will be slightly lower, but your document will still be readable.

Try draft mode on your printer to see whether it's acceptable for your print projects. Just be aware that graphics deteriorate more than text.

■ **STOP PRINTING THOSE BLANK WEB PAGES.**

You've seen them—the URL is there, and maybe the date and time, but the rest of the page is blank. Free and easy utilities (both for Windows) will fix that. GreenPrint (pick it up at www.printgreener.com) filters content before you print. You can cut out pages with only a header and footer, remove images, or not print blank pages. Or you can squeeze two pages onto one (and still get a readable document). Alternatively, HP's Smart Web Printing and Canon's Easy-WebPrint are browser add-ons for Internet Explorer and Firefox that let you grab only the parts of Web pages you want to print. They work with any printer. Get HP's add-on at www.hp.com and search "web page printing" for the link to the free download. Canon's is at www.canoneasywebprint.com/en/index.htm.

■ **BASIC BLACK IS BEST.** Color ink is more expensive than black ink. If you don't need color for what you're printing, look in your printer settings for an option to "print in grayscale" or "use black ink only."

■ **REPLACE ONLY THE COLORS YOU NEED.** Printers with tricolor cartridges force you to change all three ink



colors at the same time, even if only one color is empty. When you're shopping for printers, look for models that use separate cartridges for each color. The printer's status display will let you know exactly which one you need to replace.

■ **DON'T LET "LOW INK" WARNINGS STOP YOU**—at least not right away. You usually don't have to replace cartridges immediately after receiving that warning. We've found in some cases that you can print up to 20 percent more after the warning. So keep printing until you're not happy with how the pages look.

■ **PRINT ON BOTH SIDES OF THE PAGE.** Look for the duplexing option in the printer's settings to do this. If your printer doesn't support automatic duplexing, you can do it manually from Windows and Mac printer settings. Odd pages will print first, then you'll be prompted to reinsert the stack of paper to print even pages on the other side.

■ **SAVE SOME ELECTRICITY.** Make sure your printer's sleep mode is enabled or, if you won't be using the printer for a long while, turn it off.
