First of all, thank you, members, for your support of our fall classes.

For fall 2014, Grand Computers Club offered 67 different classes, and 82 sections, meaning we offered some classes two or three times.

We offered 27 PC classes, 13 Mac classes, and 27 Other classes. There were 129 sessions in these 82 sections. Most classes were held or are being held in the classroom, with a few in the open use room.

We added additional sections of "How to Clean Up Your PC," and "Managing Passwords with LastPass."

We accrued 244 class invoices, with 100 invoices paid by check or cash, and 144 paid by PayPal.

We still have an issue with students paying for class, but not showing up. See the chart below. This is a problem because, in some cases, we have students on a waiting list. When you don't show up for a class, you're taking a spot away from someone waiting to take that class. If you find that you cannot attend a class, contact me at education@grandcomputers.org, and I will withdraw you. We cannot offer refunds however, except for dire emergencies.

Your Board's Actions

Your Board met on October 30 and made several decisions and discussed many other topics. They include the following:

1. The Board is considering replacing the projector in the open use room as it is not bright, narrow screen, and getting old. This will be brought to a vote by the membership soon.
2. Approval of the new SIG, Digital Scrapbooking, and the renaming of Mac SIG to Apple SIG.
3. Discussion continued on the Chartered Club Policies and Procedures. The Board is probably going to be able to approve them at their next meeting. They will be posted on the club's website.
4. Approved increasing the internet speed at the club from 28Mbps to 100Mbps. This will nearly quadruple the speed for about 59% more per month.
5. Discussed the budget for next year. Finalization of the 2015 budget should be ready for member approval at the Annual meeting December 3.
6. Approved the 'Monitor of the Year' award. This will begin at the end of this year. There will be a gift card given to the winner. We will also give a gift card, of lesser value, to each of those who earn the monitor of the month. Dollar amounts will be at the discretion of the monitor director.
7. The Grand Computers Club may teach two classes to the members of the hearing impaired group under the auspices of CAM. All attendees will be Grand Computers Club members.

How Safe are Wi-Fi Hotspots

The Retired Geek Technical Tips for the Non-Technical "Over 50" Crowd

Many of us travel a lot, whether in business or just to visit our families and friends. We use our computers, smartphones and tablets in hotels, restaurants, and other places, but are these Wi-Fi "Hot Spots safe?

We all assume it's safe to connect to the Wi-Fi network at our local Starbucks, airport, waiting area where we have our cars serviced, hospital, or even at a relative's home. But it is a really bad idea...a very bad idea! There are many reasons you wouldn't want to do this. Let's look at the various types of Wi-Fi network.

Ad-hoc Networks & Access Point Networks

Basically, there are two types of Wi-Fi networks accessible by your computer: ad-hoc networks and traditional access point networks. Ad-hoc networks are getting a little outdated, but they still exist. They connect devices directly to each other, while access point networks connect devices to a central router. For example, you could connect two laptops or your laptop and your phone together without the need for a router or any other networking hardware. This would create an ad-hoc network. This is different from a traditional access point network where each device connects to a router, like you most likely have in your house.

Unsecured Network

A network is deemed unsecured just by virtue of the fact there is no password required to access it. If you're able to click on a network in your smartphone or tablet and connect to it without a password, you are connecting to an unsecured

network, and that makes the device you're using susceptible to hacking...plain and simple.

So, that "free public Wi-Fi" network you encounter at the airport is nothing more than an ad-hoc network that was probably started long ago as a service to travelers, but still persists to this day. Basically, when you connect to this type of network, you are most likely connecting to another computer. And when you connect to that other computer, your computer "could" also be set up to broadcast the "free public Wi-Fi" network to other devices around you, essentially allowing access to all your private data to anyone within range. This is not good!

Let's say you're sitting in a coffee shop and decide you want to check your email to kill some time. You scan the available networks and find one that's open and doesn't require a password. You connect and start surfing. Coffee and free Wi-Fi, how good does it get...right? Wrong! A hacker who is also fond of coffee shops and could be located within range of the router you connected to. He's waiting for someone just like you to connect to the network so he can start a middleman attack. Within a few minutes, he could easily gain access to all your passwords, including bank accounts, email, and anything else he wants. You may not think this is possible...but with today's software and technology, it is!

How to Stop Wi-Fi Crime

So how can you help prevent all this from happening? For starters, you can use *only* a secured network that encrypts all of your data. This will ensure your data is safe and scrambled as it travels between you and its destination". Now, if a hacker were to intercept your message, they would see nothing but a bunch of scrambled garbage. Of course, no security measure is 100% safe, but at least good encryption will help a lot.

Tips for connecting to unfamiliar wireless networks...if you must do so:

1. Save the really important tasks, such as online banking and other finances, for home.
2. Try not to connect to any "public" or "unsecured" networks. If you absolutely need access to the internet, pay a few bucks for the secure option.
3. When on a Wi-Fi network, look for websites that begin with "https" in the address bar, then try to use only these secure sites.
4. If you really want maximum security, use a VPN.

Lastly, tell all your friends and family to follow these Wi-Fi safety tips. You just may save someone from a major financial or identity theft disaster.
