Your help is needed. Last month I wrote of individuals who were too intimidated and too embarrassed to join the Grand Computers Club because they had no computer skills. Since then many of you have confirmed a need to reach out to them. I felt genuine enthusiasm and support from our community.

Much excitement exists among volunteers within Grand Computers Club too. I've been in contact with the Board of Directors of Sun City Grand and they also applaud our efforts to create a program for those without computer skills.

I have spent a fair amount of time think-

ing of how we can make this an exciting and rewarding project. I see this as a large project, much more than adding a few classes. I see our Club welcoming this group and creating a new level of service for them. It could include a new Special Interest Group created just for individual without computer skills. Or, the use of a "buddy" or mentor system to reduce and quickly wipe away fear and intimidation new comers might experience.

Now this is where I need your help. The Computers Club does not know who these individuals are, but you may have a friend, a neighbor or perhaps even your spouse who would benefit. I would very much like to visit with individuals having no computer skills to ask what is necessary in their minds to design a program that is truly meaningful to them.

A few questions asked would be: What would make you comfortable when learning about computers? How would you want to use a computer? What would you like to learn? Should classes last one hour or two hours? Would you be willing to provide feedback on things that might be improved?

Now the next thing we should address is whether the individual must have a computer to take classes. I do believe students must practice what is taught in class if they are to retain the information. The Computers Club has twenty computers in its Open Use Room for members to use and this is where students could practice things learned in class.

If a new student would like to buy a computer, Tech Helpers could provide

Membership's Corner-Martha McGill



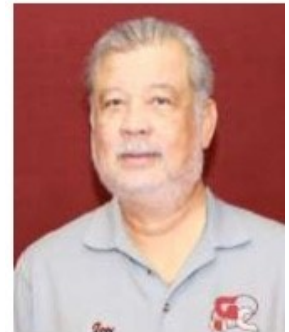

At the close of the 2016-2017 year, we boasted a total of 1,491 active members. We have garnered 233 new members since the beginning of our 2017-2018 calendar year (October 1, 2017- September 30, 2018) and at this time have a total of 1,230 members. The renovation of the Chaparral Center last summer and early fall necessitated the closure of the Club, and only Tech Help on Tuesdays, held in the Palm Center, remained as an offering to our members during that time. There were no fall classes and the closure resulted in a decline in active membership.

Would You Like to Broaden Your Investment Knowledge and Access to Investment Sources of Information?

The Financial Ed SIG leaders are thinking outside the box. What does this mean?

They are wondering if there are residents in SCG wishing they could broaden their investment skills and access investment related resources but don't know the basics, or how to get started, or where to turn for help.

As a first step, the Financial Ed SIG is creating a class for this Fall called, "Fundamentals of Investing" for the sole purpose of starting with the basics. The class will cover key steps to successful investing; understanding and managing risk; learning basic investments from FDIC bank insured CD's, Treasury bonds to stocks, mutual funds plus much more.

But this SIG hopes to do so much more to help beginners broaden their knowledge of a variety of investments. They are considering a series of meetings (via a new subgroup of the Financial Education Special Interest Group) with worthy topics. They are looking at creating this new sub-group for newcomers/inexperienced investors, so they won't feel lost in the investment world. Instead they can find support and grow in confidence.

Who would be a candidate for learning? Anyone who wants to get started with broadening their knowledge of investments. It could include a husband and wife, jointly learning; or it could be a spouse needing to learn more about investments.

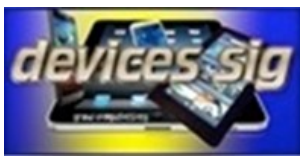
