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Tech Tip - Use Smartphone To Find Your Car

Have you walked out of the Chaparral Center and had absolutely no idea where you parked? Your smartphone can help you!

The first step is to turn on your location: Apple:

- 1. On your phone, open the Settings app
- 2. Under "Privacy & Security" tap "Location Services"
- 3. Turn it On (green)
- 4. Further down the page, the apps are listed in Alphabetical order. Select Maps and under "allow location access" select "While Using the App or Widgets"
- 5. Turn on Precise Location





Android:

- 1. On your phone, open the Settings app
- 2. Under "Personal," tap Location
- 3. Turn on location




- If you connect your iPhone to your car using Bluetooth or Apple CarPlay, the app automatically drops a Parked Carmarker on its map
- To find your car, open the app and tap on the Parked Car pin
- If driving your golf cart, hide an Air Tag in your golf cart and use the Find My App to direct you to your parking spot.





Google Maps

- After you park, open the app and tap the blue dot on the map that shows your location. Tap Save Parking.
- To find your car, open the app, tap the search bar and enter Parking Location. At the bottom of the screen, tap the Directions and Start buttons.







Use your phone's Voice Assistant

Step 1: Tell your Google Assistant (Android) or Siri (iPhone) where you parked

- On your phone, touch & hold the Home button (or side button for newer iPhones) and say "Hey Google" or "Hey Siri."
- Say, for example:
 - "I parked here"
 - "Remember where I parked"
 - "I parked my car on level two"
 - "I parked in the south lot"
 - "My parking spot is F34"

Step 2: Ask where you parked

- On your phone, touch & hold the Home button (or side button for newer iPhones) and say "Hey Google" or "Hey Siri."
- Ask, for example:
 - "Where's my car?"
 - "Where did I park?"
 - "Do you remember where I parked?"
- Your Voice Assistant will tell you where you parked. You'll also see a map that shows your parking location.



<u>Flight Simulator Special Interest Group (SIG): Introduction to the Grand Computers Club flight simulator software.</u>

The computer club has a very accurate flight simulator consisting of two computers running



four screens. One computer runs the instrument panel screen and another for the three screens displaying scenery. The current programs that are running on the flight simulator are X-Plane 11 and X-Plane 12. X-Plane 11 is older and has more aircraft available. X-Plane 12 has better scenery but being a new rewrite, it is gradually building up more aircraft that have been designed for that version. Both versions of X-Plane are accurate enough that one can fly a simple VFR flight or increase the complexity to fly an IFR flight ending in an approach to minimums at the chosen airport. The cockpit consists of a very comfortable seat

that is adjustable with high accuracy joystick, rudder pedals and controls. The aircraft vary from a simple J-3 Piper Cub up to a Boeing 787 airliner.

Even if you have no prior experience in flight or if you are a high time private pilot, we can start you off with an instructor to learn how to use the equipment and if necessary, teach you how to fly. Certified versions of this software are used to practice instrument flight and are able to log it for the FAA.

Our flight simulator SIG meetings are held on the fourth Friday of the month from 4 to 5:30 PM in the Open Use room from October to April.

We hope to see any pilots or "wannabe" pilots at our next Flight Simulator SIG meeting or in the club to check out the simulator.




Volunteers Needed!
